

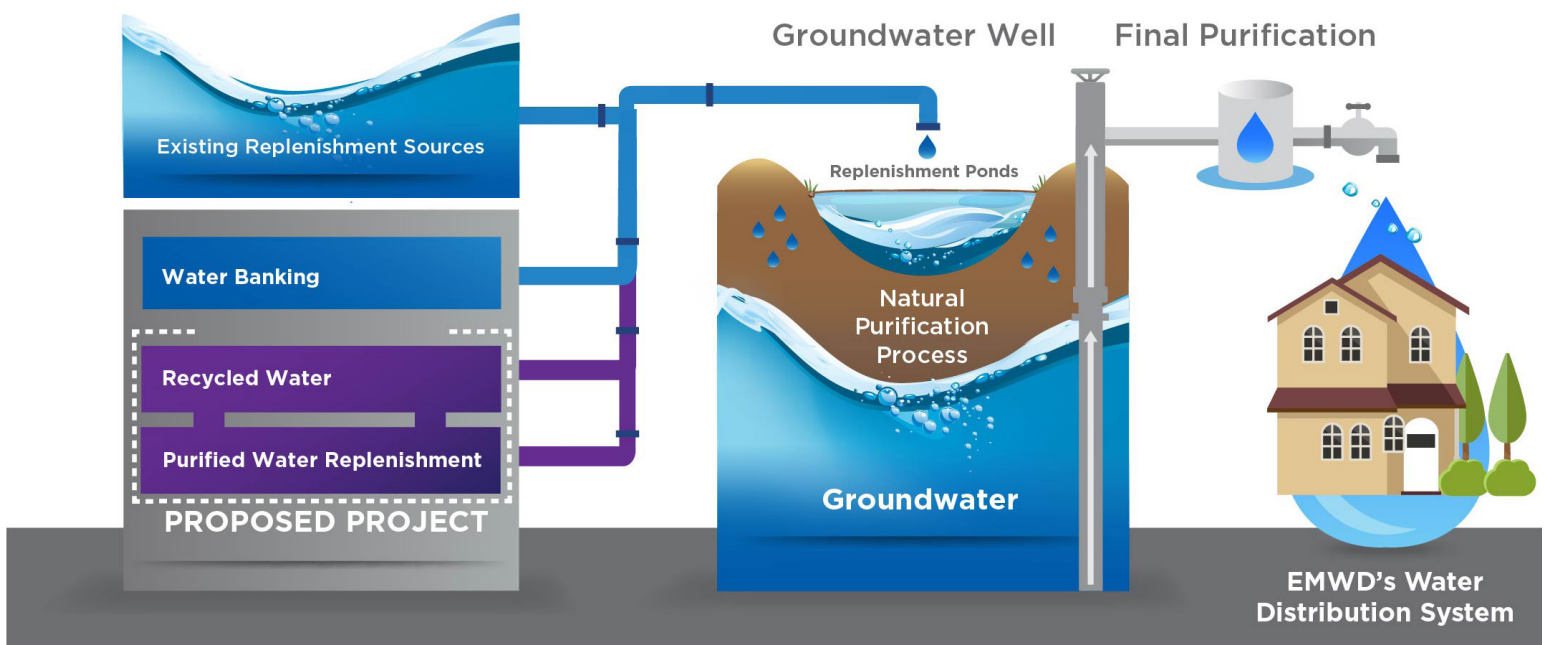

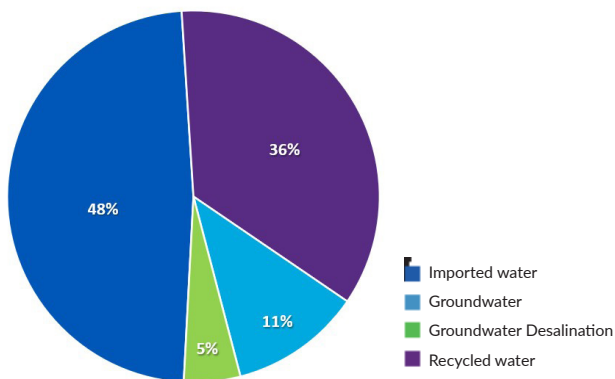
Securing Our Water Future

Since its inception, Eastern Municipal Water District (EMWD) has used forward-thinking methods to provide a safe and reliable water supply to all of its customers. To address the community's water needs, EMWD has developed and implemented projects and management practices that make the most of its water supply portfolio from imported, local and recycled water resources.

GROUNDWATER RELIABILITY PLUS is about EMWD's efforts to improve the quality and quantity of the water in our local groundwater basins, also called aquifers.

▶ WHAT IS RECYCLED WATER?

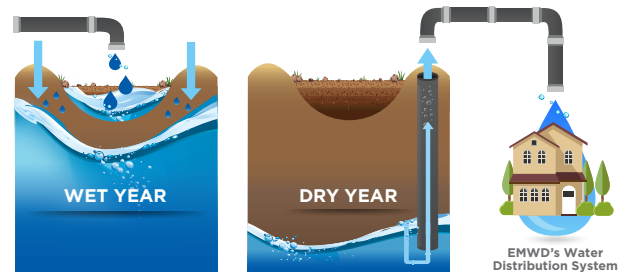
Recycled water is a safe, renewable, drought-proof water source. It is wastewater that has been cleaned to make it suitable and safe for irrigation, industrial and other uses.

Recycled water has been used for irrigation and industrial use—and as a supplement to drinking water supplies—for many years throughout California and the United States.

GROUNDWATER RELIABILITY PLUS

WATER BANKING is a program that will replenish the San Jacinto Groundwater Basin with water during normal and wet years for short-term or long-term storage and use.

EMWD has constructed groundwater banking facilities including percolation basins, pipelines and production wells.

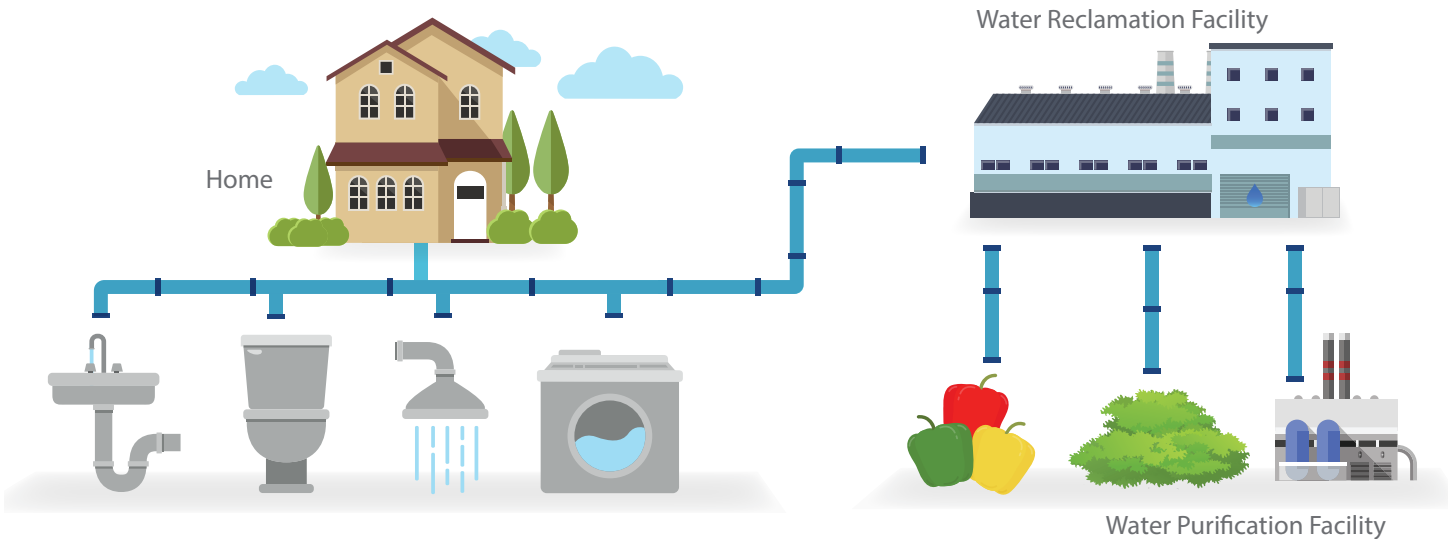


Soil Aquifer Treatment

occurs when water, including recycled water, soaks into the ground and is purified by the physical and biological processes that naturally occur in soil.

► PURIFIED WATER REPLENISHMENT Our Newest Project

EMWD will start with recycled water and purify it using a multi-stage process of microfiltration and reverse osmosis. The purified water will then blend with additional treated water prior to being pumped into replenishment ponds, where it will be further purified through a natural purification process. Water pumped from the ground will go through one final cleaning step before it is sent to area homes and businesses.
